This month we have two clergy letters as the summer edition of St Ninian's Review coincides with the publication of this magazine.

Canon Bayne writes: "We believe that God never sleeps, but the Church undoubtedly dozes a bit in the summer months: clubs, organisations and committees are in temporary abeyance; many people are away on holiday; friends and relatives who come to visit take up our time; the garden, the beach or the golf course are seductive alternatives to attending Church. The clergy and other congregational leaders use this quiet time to begin to plan things like study groups, sermon series, special events and (Oh, no! Not yet!) Carol Services.

I realised I was behind with my prep, driving into Kirkcudbright the other day, when I spotted Arden House's enormous banner advertising its Christmas dinners and parties. The early part of the year has been so remarkably busy that forward planning has had to give way to "sufficient unto the day......" We are currently operating as a group of four Charges, served by nine clergy (eight of whom are supposed to be retired!) three lay readers, and four worship leaders. Just planning the Sunday services and rostering the clergy has become a series of major exercises that risk obscuring the wider view.

While we continue to hope and pray that a new Rector will emerge soon for St. Mary's and Greyfriars, we nevertheless need to develop a shared vision for the charges that will encourage us to grow in Christ. During this quieter summer time, we all need to reflect on how we can work more creatively, both among ourselves and with our brothers and sisters in Christ of the other denominations (who find themselves in exactly the same situation as ourselves) so that the Church in the Stewartry can have not just a viable but a vibrant future. The Mission Action Plans, on which our congregations have been working separately, and which have helped us to a better self-understanding , will also help us to spot opportunities to work together.

The Revd Mark Smith writes: It is a privilege to be asked to write a message for the Church Magazine. It is also an opportunity.

An opportunity to thank those of you who have made Debbie and myself (and Natasha & Isaac) so very welcome as we join with you on Sundays. An opportunity to publicly thank Bishop Gregor and Canon David Bayne and the Vestries (both here and St Ninian's) for inviting me to help in the ministry of the parishes at this time. An opportunity to walk with you through this time of change and challenge. We look forward to it!

In terms of a message, I am not sure where to start. It is not yet Advent with its anticipation nor Christmas with its drama nor Lent with its preparation nor Holy Week with its passion nor Easter with its celebration nor Pentecost or Trinity with their inspiration and teaching.

It is Summertime. In the well-known words of Ira Gershwin: "Summertime ... and the living is easy." Many regular activities and groups have stopped meeting, children and families think of holidays, students chill for months on end. It is holiday time! The very word 'holiday' has its roots in 'holy day' – it is not time off from God, rather time to be with Him in whatever way we can. Time set apart for a special purpose. Time to let God

guide us rather than the usual schedules. It is a holy opportunity.

The reduced busy-ness gives us a chance to catch up, walk and rest. Catch up with God, walk with Jesus, rest in the Spirit. Summer is a chance to recharge the batteries – emotional, physical, mental <u>and</u> spiritual – to be ready for what lies ahead. Why not read the Bible instead of that holiday book? Stroll round asking Jesus to help you see people as He does? Spend time reflecting on the lessons of Advent, Christmas, Lent, Holy Week, Easter, Pentecost with the Spirit as your guide?

Summer is over all too soon. We have a lot to be ready for. We face many challenges as a congregation ... or should I say many opportunities? Changes ... or steps on the journey of faith? The wider Church is facing many things and we don't yet know what God has in store for us. Let's use what is left of the Summer to re-tune to God's way, receive Jesus' love and hear the Spirit's inner guidance so that we are ready ... for whatever He has for us.

Anthony Duncalf, Honorary Secretary, has provided this summary of the Meeting of Christ Church Vestry held on the 15th July, 2015.

- ⇒ A number of essential electrical works are in hand to get the Rectory ready for a new tenancy, as well as replacing some faulty windows. We are also looking to get a gardener in to bring the garden back up to scratch and maintain it until new tenants are found.
- ⇒ The next phase of the church lighting will be going ahead shortly, adding further spotlights in the body of the church and re-siting those at the front to cut down on 'glare'.
- ⇒ Plans for the re-modelling of the tower and entrance porch have now been submitted to the Planning Authority we await their findings.
- ⇒ It was agreed to join forces with St Peter's with our 'Food Bank' donations, with items donated going to the Kirkcudbright Food Bank (which is where any Dalbeattie residents in need are directed by the Council).
- ⇒ Concern has been expressed that the current format of three Church sales per year is starting to place increasing pressure on a declining number of helpers. It was proposed that in 2016 we do not hold a Winter Sale, and that the Colvend Sale be relocated to a date in August, creating a longer interval following the Plant Sale in May. A Convenor is still needed for this year's Winter Sale willing volunteers would be most welcome.
- ⇒ It was agreed to join in with the Christian Aid initiative of praying for an end to conflict in Palestine/Israel on the 24th of each month; this will be included on the weekly pew sheets on the appropriate Sunday, and we hope many of the congregation will include this in their personal prayers.
- ⇒ Muriel Palmer will be stepping down as editor of the Magazine after the November edition. We are very grateful for her sterling work. It is hoped someone will come forward to take on this task and ensure the Magazine continues into 2016 and beyond, even if in a slightly different form.

Edith Thorp, Lay Representative reports on the Galloway Regional Council meeting held on 6 July 2015 at Castle Douglas.

The presentation to the Regional Council was from *Putting You First Development Officers* from *Third Sector Dumfries and Galloway* on *Health and Social Care Integration: Understanding Faith Groups as Community Assets*. Not the best presentation or facilitation, but the main bit of information gleaned, was that should we wish to know where the need for our involvement in the local community might be, they were the organisation to contact!

Possible extension of the Ecumenical Learning Agreement following the review of the same in Annandale and Eskdale. I had been at that meeting with the Revd John Macleod (Lockerbie) and as he was away on a course, I spoke to it. In my opinion it seemed that the Regional Council might be the forum to invite representation from all the Presbyteries to the meetings. Doing that could start the process of Regional cross-fertilisation of ideas/

training etc. It was discussed, but no conclusion as to the way forward was come to. David Bayne reported from Diocesan Council that there were eleven vacancies in the Diocese among other things.

A seven page report from the General Synod had been circulated. The item that interested me was the initiative to pray on the 24th of each month for a peaceful resolution of the Palestinian/Israeli conflict. A Christian Aid initiative taken up by ACTS (Action of Churches Together in Scotland). No response was given to my seeing the initiative as a possible thing that the Regional charges might take forward!

St Mary's, Gatehouse of Fleet had made application for a grant of £2,885 to install windows in the outer doors under the MAP plan to make their church more visible and welcoming. Approved by Regional Council and the Diocese.

From my point of view, I did not find it a very inspiring meeting.

Thanks are due to Anthony for writing the following about one of his favourite hymns.

I thought I'd write a brief review of a song of praise which most of you probably won't know: it's what I'd call a modern classic, which has been around since the mid-90s, but hasn't yet made it into the standard episcopal hall of fame!

"Shout to the Lord" originates from Australia's Hillsong Fellowship, written by the prolific Darlene Zschech. It has a great tune (always important!), which builds through the verse proclaiming "My Saviour ... tower of refuge and strength" - into the chorus, lifting the spirit as the words proclaim "Power and majesty, praise to the King", in words which echo many of the Psalms -"Mountains bow down and the seas will roar at the sound of Your Name".

I first encountered the song while attending a large Pentecostal church in Leeds, at a time of considerable change in my life, and I found that the words spoke very much into my heart, reassuring me of the enduring presence and comfort of the Lord amidst all the turmoil of our life on earth, and inspiring me to echo the resolve to "Let every breath... never cease to worship You."

The Revd Beryl Scott has written this account of the Theological Reflection Meeting held at St. Peter's on the 9th June presented by by Father Joe Boland., parish priest of St Bride's, West Kilbride.

We enjoyed an interesting, illustrated talk about 'Pope Francis' with Argentina as the background. Pope Francis is the first Latin American, and first Jesuit, to lead the Roman Catholic Church. He was accepted by both Church conservatives and reformers, seen as orthodox on most matters, but liberal on social justice, although far from being a 'Liberal Theologist', abiding by the teaching of the Church.

Jorge Bergoglio was born in Argentina in 1936. His grandparents and their children left Italy in 1927 to settle in Argentina. Jorge was brought up at a time of renewed in social justice in this prominently Catholic country. He trained in a Jesuit seminary and felt called to priesthood, and became a Jesuit, studying in both Argentina and Germany. It was a time of 'Liberal Theology' associated with Marxism. The Vatican could not accept Marxism which caused class war, and Jorge followed its line which caused trouble and a split among the Jesuits; he received much opposition from the government as well as the Jesuits. He lived in tension with the authorities for their lack of care for the impoverished during some very difficult times. An extremely difficult period, called the 'Dirty War' saw thousands of people made to disappear by the government.

He became a Bishop in 1992 and Archbishop of Buenos Aires in 1998. He became a Cardinal in 2005; as Cardinal Bergoglio he was greeted jubilantly. Part of his public appeal lay in his sober austerity, rejecting the pomp and living a humble life style. He had great concern for the poor and a commitment to dialogue as a way to build bridges between people of all backgrounds, beliefs and faiths. At the end of Father Boland's well received talk, there was a short period of questions.

The session ended with notice of the next meeting to be held on the 8th of September, the speaker will be the Revd Dr Ewan Kelly from the Church of Scotland; he is the Lead for Spiritual Care at NHS Dumfries and Galloway.





Thanks are due to Graham Brignall for his account of two HOLIDAY DISCOVERIES

In May while on holiday in Ardnamurchan Miranda and I came across St Finan's Church, Kinlochmoidart. The house which used to be there was where Prince Charles Edward Stewart spent the week before his rally at Glenfinnan. The church was built in 1858 and was, at the time, the most northerly Episcopal church in the UK.

We were pleasantly surprised to find a notice on the door telling us the church was open, so we entered and discovered a beautiful little church with mostly bare stone walls and lots of stained glass windows. On the north wall was fixed the wooden cross which had been used to denote the burial place, near to where he was killed in action, of Lt. Kenneth Forbes Meiklejohn, 1st Cameron Highlanders, who died fighting in Aisne on 25th September 1914, aged 29, making him one of the earliest casualties of World War 1. The cross had been brought home, but his remains lie interred at the British Cemetery at Vendresse. He left a widow, and a son who was born 6 months after his father's death.

The church now holds one service every month and also a monthly service in the Church of Scotland church of St Mary in Strontian.

The second holiday find was made in July when we visited the Episcopal Church of St Ninian's, Glen Urquhart, Dumnadrochet

The first incumbent dates from 1854 (which might question the claim made by my previous holiday find). It seats about 70 people and is unusual in that a meeting room is underneath the vestry.

Set into the altar is a stone carved with a simple cross which came from the now demolished church at Temple in the mouth of Glen Urquhart. Historians now consider that Temple was the most northerly base of St Ninian, so this very early cross may have been seen by our Patron Saint at the end of the 4th century.


