Bishop Gregor's Christmas 2016 Message

This is the Bishop's amended message which unfortunately I did not open until after the printing of the magazine, MP



As I write, the clocks have gone back and things are getting darker. People now talk of light deprivation as a medical condition and it does seem that some of us are susceptible to all of that.

But, at this time of the year, there's a lot of extra light around. Crowds of people out shopping and enjoying themselves among the brightly lit streets. Christmas lights and Christmas attractions. And, here in Glasgow, down at the St Enoch Centre, the wooden booths of

the Christmas market, gluwein, bratwurst and those wonderful German Christmas robins, like the one I bought a couple of years ago, on sale once more. Wet, grey, dark there of course too, but surrounded by light, colour, life, fun.

It's easy enough, it's fatally easy enough, for Christian people like us, to dismiss all of this as so much tinselly trivia, utterly unrelated to what we like to call the "true meaning of Christmas". Well, if you have thoughts like that, let me try to persuade you this Christmastide to give them up, once and for all.

People like us who will gather at the Christmas eucharist to welcome the true light who lightens everyone coming into the world, have no business being sniffy about people's desire at a dark time of the year to enjoy light and warmth and being together in that light and warmth. We should have the imagination to sense that, however vaguely, this is a very natural, very human, and so ultimately God-given reaching out for something better that lies beyond the often dark and grim realities of the world we live in – and, God knows, they are dark enough.

So, for us, far from being nowhere near the true meaning of Christmas, the Christmas lights in streets, on countless trees, the reindeers and snowmen plastered all over houses or wherever, should point us towards another light. And here's the difference - sometime in January all the Christmas and seasonal lights and all the Christmas and seasonal attractions will disappear, put away for another year. Like many people I hate taking all my own lights and cards and tree down – the house looks so bare – but I ought to remember that the light we have been celebrating in the twelve days of Christmas shines all the year round and can never be taken away or extinguished.

One of the simplest and yet most powerful testimonies I ever heard to this great hope of ours was offered by one of my curates when I was Rector of St Ninian's in Pollokshields on the south side of Glasgow. He was taking some children round that wonderful church and they noticed the white light burning above the altar of the side chapel, where the sacrament of consecrated bread and wine was kept. Why was that light burning away there? Well, he said, it is there to remind us that Jesus the light of the world is always with us so that, even if we came into this big church in the dark we needn't be afraid because Jesus is here, Jesus is with us, the light still burns.

So, this coming Christmastide let's allow ourselves to be pointed once again towards that single, world-changing, all-important truth, the Light of the World. He came into the world all those years ago looking for us and He comes into our midst this Christmas on the same quest, to embrace us with joy and wonder so that we may do the very same to Him.

Care & Share & Prayer at Christ Church

One of the priorities identified as part of our MAP process this year is Communication.

This covers much of what we do in terms of website, pew-sheet, publicity and so on, but also affects our ability to react as a body to needs which arise within the congregation (and beyond).

If a person is in need, we would like to be able to respond quickly through Prayer and practical demonstrations of Christ's Love. This is best done as a whole Body, increasing the Prayer potential and releasing the gifts that we have between us. It is, however, easy for some news or concern to be missed by one or other member – even in what seems a small fellowship.

We have now set up the **Care & Share & Prayer** network to ensure clear communication pathways. This sounds very grand and business-like but is, actually, very straightforward. It will use the telephone as most of us have telephones and most use answermachines so that we know the messages will get through.

If someone has a need or concern, or becomes aware of a need or concern for someone else, they should simply telephone a central number. These folk will then disseminate the information around the fellowship for Prayer through the network of home-groups and directly to others. This will enable us as a congregation to harness the power of Prayer, ensure that we are all aware of the needs of those around us and free us to Share Christ's Love in whatever ways we can. It should also be used to pass on Good News as an encouragement for the congregation. It will feed into our intercessions on Sunday, our prayer in the home-groups and our personal concerns for those around us.

This is not intended as a gossip-spreader for nosey neighbours, but a means of putting our Love into action to build up our Faith in action by meeting real needs and addressing real concerns.

We do not need detailed information or even the names of people to be able to Pray effectively. God knows the need and the people and can hear our Prayers however vague they may feel to us.

We hope this network will enable us to build a more Caring community and see the power of Prayer at work as we seek to Share Christ's Love with those around us.

SAINT of the MONTH

Saint Ethernan: 2nd December

Ethernan, or Adrian as he is sometimes known, was probably Pictish in origin, born of noble parents. He was sent to study in Ireland and returned to Scotland in about 650, bringing with him a band of monks with whom he spread the faith of the gospels around the east coast of Scotland, especially Fife. He sought a heavenly reward in return for living a life of abstinence, the subjugation of carnal lusts and by removing the temptations of the world. He moved to the Isle of May, where he founded a primitive chapel, where a small religious community survived on what they could grow and on the milk from a few cows which they kept. They offered sanctuary to seamen who were wrecked on the island. He died in about 669. In later times the successors of the community burnt a light to warn seafarers of the dangers around the island; this became known as the light of St Ethernan.

Saint Ernan: 1st January

Ernan was an uncle of Columba and was one of the twelve who travelled to Iona with him. He was made abbot of Hinba, an island about which there has been much discussion; it could be Canna, or Jura, or Eilach an Naoimh, between Scarba and Mull, or none of these. He was only abbot for a few days. He had been told by Columba that, when he was leaving to go to Hinba, he did not expect to see him again in this life; several days later Ernan became sick and went back to Iona to see his nephew. When Columba was told his uncle had returned, he happily went to see him in the harbour; however, when they were only 50 yards apart, Columba's prophecy was fulfilled and Ernan fell down dead.

There are three other saints of this name, one of whom was a nephew of Columba, so stories are bound to become unclear.

THE MISSING BEDROOM in remembrance of Mary Smith

One of the happiest times I spent with Mary Smith occurred in 2005. Gill Sinclair had the great idea for the three of us to spend a 'painting' week in Donegal, Ireland. She booked a self catering single storied old thatched cottage.

In the brochure it sounded ideal for our needs and it looked idyllic. It was dusk when we arrived. The cottage certainly looked picturesque. We found the key under a stone by the front door as arranged. So trusting!! The wee cottage had been described as having THREE bedrooms but we could only find TWO with a single bed in each. Where was the third? It was a worrying situation to be in and we were in a quandary what to do about it.

Then glancing upwards we spotted a covered hatch in the ceiling with a hook attached and in a corner a pole with another hook on the end. Hopefully the mystery of the missing bedroom was about to be solved. Pulling on the hook brought down a steep wooden ladder. Climbing up revealed, under very low eaves, a chair and another single bed. Praise the lord we now had a bed each to sleep in. The three of us were into our eighties but as Mary was the elder by nine years and Gill was recovering from a broken leg, I volunteered to be the one to climb up to bed then pull up the ladder after me. Fortunately my bladder was still in good nick.

The cottage consisted of one main living room in which to cook, dine and relax. Hanging from the ceiling was a lone electric bulb with a shortish string attached. We searched high and low for a switch to turn this light on and off, but to no avail. Consequently, standing on a chair then clambering onto a table to pull the string became the norm. Unfortunately we were all three rather short in stature. We returned home fitter!!

Everything that could go wrong in that cottage DID. Electrics, plumbing and cooker were unpredictable. It also poured with rain practically all week. But undeterred we set off each day (plus picnic) to paint. Wearing waterproofs, carrying collapsible seats, pads, paints and easels, we sat under dripping umbrellas hoping to produce a masterpiece. We then finished them off in the evening sat around the table under that single bulb.

The whole set up for a painting holiday for three old biddies couldn't have been a worse choice. But instead of moaning about it we embraced it and had a whale of a time. I have never laughed so much on a holiday in my whole life. It was a week of the greatest fun and one of the most unforgettable. The more things went wrong the more we giggled like schoolgirls. Mary, bless her, had a cheerful disposition, Gill was her usual serene unflappable self, whilst I had been brought up to muck in whatever the circumstances. Noth-

ing got us down or dampened our high spirits. Maybe we found roughing it at our time of life was an unexpected challenge for us to conquer and enjoy to the full, which we certainly did with gusto!

After returning home we did not make any complaints about the misrepresentation of the cottage. Its Irish eccentricities transformed our holiday into a quirky exciting adventure that we would not have changed one iota. We even managed to bring back some paintings of a magical Donegal, alas no masterpieces.

The Advent Wreath

The Advent Ring and Candles are symbols of the Hope, Peace, Joy and Love that Christ brings into the world. The Ring reminds us of the unbroken Love of God.. The greenery reminds us of the New Life of Christ. The Candles proclaim the Light of Christ coming into the world

The Christ Church wreath has five candles; three purple, one rose and one white.

One candle is lit on each Sunday during Advent at the beginning of the Eucharist Service. Each candle represents an aspect of the spiritual preparation for the coming of the Lord Jesus Christ.

On the first Sunday of Advent, the first purple candle is lit. This candle represents **Hope** or expectation in anticipation of the coming Messiah.

On the second Sunday of Advent, the second purple candle is lit. This candle represents **Peace**.

On the third Sunday of Advent the pink candle is lit. This candle represents Joy.

The fourth and last purple candle represents **Love** and is lit on the fourth Sunday of Advent.

On Christmas Eve, the white centre candle is lit. This candle represents the Light of Christ that has come into the world.

The Friends from all over the world help a little by paying just £15 for membership, there are about 200 of us, and we would like to increase this number. There are some leaflets at the back of our church for any of you who have not yet become a Friend, explaining the advantages and what is involved.

As well as helping to raise money an important part of the weekend is meeting up with friends from as far apart as South Uist, Wales and the South of England. We enjoy interesting talks, time to chat and renew friendships. Also, some of us enjoy walking along the wonderful coast and hills of the island. As always the food is delicious.

The Cathedral has a wonderful record for very good music, led by the Chaplain and Organist, Alistair. He taught music for many years and still does. This enables him to attract his pupils, many well known, to share their music with us. This year the **Glasgow Chamber Choir** came over, led by Frikki Walker, the Glasgow Cathedral organist and music leader. They, along with Alistair, provided a wonderful Service of Music and Words for All Souls Tide. ANOTHER HOLIDAY GEM



St Margaret's Church, Aberlour

During our recent stay in Moray we were intrigued, while visiting Charlestown of Aberlour (population about 1,000), to see a sign for the local Episcopal Church soon after entering the town. We drove up the 100-yard long tree-lined driveway to find a wonderful 1875 church which was far bigger than any other Episcopal church we have come across. Fortunately we stumbled across a churchyard working group, which meant we were able to enter the church, which would normally have been closed. We were made to feel very

welcome by two ladies of the congregation, who told us that the church was built as a place of worship for the children and staff of Aberlour Orphanage, which closed in 1967 and the buildings demolished.

The church is in the diocese of Moray, Ross and Caithness and holds weekly Sunday services, sometimes led by the bishop, who is the rector. The building is grade A listed. We were given coffee and a brief history of the church and orphanage. They allowed us to take photographs and also gave us a copy of a booklet about the history of the orphanage, which we shall share with you in the next couple of magazines.

Just to give you a taste of what life was like for the orphans, here are some memories of some of them:

"If you were very bad you were told to clean all the brass in the church."

"If you sang a wrong note you were sent behind the organ to pump air into it."

"One real complaint of mine was the church and all the prayers. You had them at breakfast, dinner, tea, supper <u>and</u> bedtime. You had to learn a verse of a psalm and if you could not say it off by heart you got the belt."

"The services were often conducted by Wolfie (Canon Wolfe, the Warden of the Orphanage for over 30 years). He had two black labrador dogs called Spey and Lour. They attended every service and, on arrival, headed for the altar, where they lay for the duration of the service."

Hope is a gift of the Holy Spirit which, with faith and love, is an essential characteristic of a Christian when prophecies, tongues and knowledge pass away.

1 Corinthians 13: 8-13

The Greek noun elpis, with its related verb elpizo, usually rendered as hope, occur 54 and 31 times respectively in the New Testament. The biblical concept of hope is not mere expectation and desire, but includes:

Confidence Romans 15: 13

Christ as our hope Colossians 1: 24-27 and 1Timothy 1:1-2

Hopes for redemption Romans 8: 22-25

Blessed hope Titus 1: 1-3; 2: 11-14

Hope and purity 1 John 3: 1-3

Hope and faith Hebrews 11: 1-3 and 1 Corinthians 15: 12-19

Hope is not spoken of in the Gospels, while Jesus was on Earth, or in Revelation.

Paul was animated by hope. Acts 26: 4-8; 28: 17-20

New Testament hope has its roots deep in the Old Testament; in the King James version hope translates a variety of Hebrew words meaning, for example, confidence, trust and safety.

Statement of Belief for Inclusive Church

"We believe in an Inclusive Church which does not discriminate, on any level, on grounds of economic power, gender, mental health, physical ability, race or sexuality. We believe in Church which welcomes and serves all people in the name of Jesus Christ; which is scripturally faithful; which seeks to proclaim the Gospel afresh for each generation; and which, in the power of the Holy Spirit, allows all people to grasp how wide and long and high and deep is the love of Jesus Christ."

At the AGM held on the 6th November, the idea of affiliating Christ Church with the organisation 'Inclusive Church' (IC) was discussed, but a decision postponed until the Extraordinary General Meeting to be held in December, to allow people more time to look at what is involved.

The organisation is basically a loose affiliation of congregations and individuals who are in agreement with the above Statement of Belief, and who are concerned to develop ways of ministry which break down the barriers which can keep particular groups of people from joining the church. Originating within the Church of England in 2003 the organisation now includes various denominations, and is keen to develop its network within Scotland. They provide training materials and support for congregations to understand some of the issues which may exclude or alienate particular groups of people, so we can create the most welcoming and supportive atmosphere possible. As a congregation, Christ Church works hard at being welcoming to all – this is part of our Mission Action Plan – so being a part of this wider grouping might be a useful way of building on what we are already aiming to do. Joining IC costs us nothing and would not only give us access to their various resources, but place us on their register of Inclusive Churches (a useful resource for folk who have had negative experiences in the past) and provide us with a plaque to display as a sign of our commitment to all manner of people.

At the AGM, some questions were raised which I felt it worth addressing here.

1. There are many worthy groups – we can't join them all!

Most groups are closely allied to one particular cause - e.g. children's welfare, poverty relief etc. - but Inclusive Church seems to embody the very crux of the Gospel; that all people everywhere are welcome within the kingdom and that we need to guard against erecting barriers which would prevent folk who differ from ourselves from becoming fully integrated into the Body of Christ. We are not a 'holy huddle' standing aloof from those outside, but a fellowship of imperfect human beings reaching out to share the hope set before us with all who need it.

2. Why do we need a plaque to say we welcome everyone?

Sadly, the Church does not tend to have the image of being particularly open and inclusive towards many in society. Many people are used to being labelled and marginalised by 'the establishment', and associate the church with those kind of attitudes. Historically, churches have been seen as the preserve of white, middle class people who look down on those who do not fit their standards — an impression which, in some cases, has (and can still be)

been justified by what people see and hear. I am sure many of us have invited someone to church who has replied "I wouldn't fit in – they wouldn't want someone like me there" and others who have stories of being let down or rejected by churches in the past. However, the Gospels demonstrate that the Church is designed to offer hope to precisely such marginalised individuals. If we, as a congregation, are serious in our resolve to reflect this message by doing our utmost to ensure all comers can find a safe and nurturing place among us, then we need to take every opportunity to make that known.

3. Joining I.C. may cause offence to some.

If as a congregation we truly believe in welcoming and affirming all manner of people, then anyone joining us who does not share those values will eventually become angered, frustrated or upset by our acceptance of some individual or group that they do not believe belong within the church. To be up front about what we believe and why will mean people are aware from the outset of what we stand for, and can choose whether or not to join us on that basis, rather than assuming we see things as they do and then being offended when they realise otherwise. If we believe something is right, then we should not be afraid to say so, even at the risk of upsetting someone else's sensibilities — perhaps our speaking up may even help them re-evaluate things. We might ask how Jesus would react in a similar situation.

When I go to St Ninian's, Castle Douglas I like to sit at the back, on the right-hand side so that I can read the inscription on the stained glass window. MP

Roucan Loch Woodland Burial Site

The inspirational *Roucan Loch Woodland Burial Site* allows coffin interment and a return to nature for those who wish to be laid to rest amongst wildflowers with the sound of animals and birdsong close by.

The serene site which is just over three miles from the centre of Dumfries, overlooks tranquil waters where abundant wildlife, calming birdsong and panoramic views of the rolling Dumfriesshire landscape offer a natural final resting place.

Roucan Loch Woodland Burial Site is unique. It is the first site in the country which has been pre-planted with native trees including rowan, birch and alder. Each tree becomes a living memorial in place of a traditional headstone and each plot allows loved ones to lie side by side in the peaceful woodland.

Through the changing seasons the beauty of nature is timeless; the golden daffodils and the blossoms of spring, the sun-dappled, leafy shade of summer, the stunning blaze of autumn glory and the frosted patterns on bare branches in winter.

Gradually, over the years the woodland will develop, with an abundance of wildlife making its home amongst the trees and carpet of wild flowers.

Roucan Loch Woodland Burial Site is in effect a nature reserve, providing peace of mind for the family as the site will remain a protected natural environment in perpetuity.

Roucan Loch is open daily and you are invited to experience for yourself its beauty at weekends between 10am-4pm. No appointment is necessary. From Dumfries follow the A709 Dumfries to Lockerbie Road for approx. 1 mile until signposted Roucan Loch.


