

Message from the Revd Mark Smith

APRIL this year is half in Lent and half in Easter. A month of two halves ... and just like footballers, the job of the Church is to get the Cross over!

The Cross is, quite literally, the crux of the matter ... the link between Lent and Easter. It closes the chapter on the bad things which separate us from God. It starts a new relationship between us and God. It opens the way to Eternal Life with God for all who believe.

The idea of people giving their lives for others is one we are familiar with. We all know of the heroes of wars in the past. Those in the trenches, the mud and the death-camps. More recently we saw a policeman give his life seeking to protect others from a terrorist attack on the streets of London. We understand the concept of sacrifice for the greater good, for others to live, with no thought of the cost.

- On the Cross Jesus gave His life for me and you. He freely gave everything for us with no chance of us paying Him back!
- He gave up being infinite and eternal to become just as human as you and I remember
 Christmas!
- He healed the sick, challenged the religious, encouraged the downtrodden read the gospels.
- He was arrested, falsely accused and wrongly sentenced to death and crucified Good
 Friday.
- He was buried in a borrowed tomb guarded by soldiers and His followers hid Easter
 Eve.
- He was raised from the dead, the guards fled and His followers celebrated Easter Day.
- He ascended up into the clouds in front of His Disciples to live on with the Father –
 Ascension Day.

At Easter we celebrate together and join Christians around the world in remembering and celebrating the incomprehensible love of God shown in Jesus so that we can know Him in our lives.

Please join us during Holy Week and Easter to learn more of the link between the Cross and the Empty Tomb as we follow the journey Christ made on our behalf and celebrate the gift of life He won for us.

As Lent closes we acknowledge our need of God's intervention in our lives. We shout 'Hosanna!' and wave our Palm Crosses on Palm Sunday as we welcome the King of kings riding on a donkey. On Good Friday we look up at the dying Jesus as He opens wide His arms for us on the Cross and we remember that He is there for me ... for you. On Easter Day we sing 'Alleluia!' as we receive the Risen Saviour into our lives and look forward to the new relationship with God He has made possible – Eternal Life.

It may be a journey we can make with Him and never look back. May God Bless you.

WORLD DAY OF PRAYER - 3RD MARCH "Am I being unfair to you?"



This was well attended and we were grateful for the support and participation of members of the Parish Church, St Peter's Church and the Galloway Christian Fellowship. The theme was fairness and the order of service was written by women of the Philippines. There were thoughts about economic justice, which is, sadly, lacking in the Philippines, resulting in millions of people living in poverty. Members of Christ Church produced a dramatized reading of the Parable of the Vineyard (Matthew 20: 1-16) and then there was reflection on the Philippino practice of "Dagyaw", in which people work co-operatively and collectively to plant crops and then to share the harvest; during this bowls of fruit were passed round and everyone was invited to partake. Everyone left feeling there was much upon which to reflect, especially the parable's message that fairness is not just about equal treatment for everyone; keeping your word can be just as important a consideration.

Many thanks to Julie Dennison, who masterminded the whole evening, and to her team of helpers for making the evening such a success.

DIOCESAN SYNOD - 4 MARCH 2017

The Synod this year was held at the Barony College, which made it easier travelling for those from Galloway. As the Bishop was still recovering from his stroke, the Dean presided at the Eucharist and enacted the Constitution of the Synod.

As with every Synod there are certain formalities that have to be gone through; welcome, apologies, appointments and approval of last year's Minutes. Then the elections. Various reports were submitted, and that took up most of the morning!

However, we did have three Canon Laws to vote upon. **Canon 22** about *Of Divine Worship and Administration of Sacraments and Other Rites and Ceremonies of the Church*, which went through with little comment.

However, **Canon 31** was *Of the Solemnisation of Holy Matrimony*. The issue that *Marriage* should include same sex couples. The discussion wasn't long, heated, or acrimonious, and it was felt that those issues had been debated at length during the long process that this issue had gone through before it came to Synod. The Bishop in his Charge to the Synod (written in December '16) had given his reasons for voting against the motion of changing the Canon to include same sex couple within 'marriage'. The vote was cast by the whole of Synod, not in houses, and was 59 for the motion, 33 against the motion - less than a 2/3 majority, which if the same is reflected in General Synod in June '17, the motion would not pass and the Canon would remain as it stands at present - 'marriage' is between a man and a woman.

An excellent lunch followed.

In the afternoon The Bishop's Lent Appeal was announced - Scottish Refugee Council - last year's total for the Bethlehem Arab Society came to £14,125.55.

The Accounts were presented: various alterations with the presentation and what goes where had been worked through during the year, and the final figure was that the Diocese was in surplus to the tune of £41,131 approx. The budget for the coming year was presented.

A very pregnant Canon Missioner (Audrey Stewart) gave a very encouraging, and enthusiastic, presentation. Three strands that the Bishop has identified for her to concentrate on were CMD (Continuing Ministry Development), MDR (Ministry Development Review), and the MAP (Mission Action Plan). She is certainly not an Ann Tomlinson and it will be interesting to see how her work develops over the years.

It had been agreed that along with the appointment of the Canon Missioner, a Canon Theologian would be appointed to the Cathedral Chapter.

Reports from the Worship and Liturgy Development Team, The Provincial Youth Network 20 Anniversary, Holy Land Pilgrimage 2018, and Thanksgiving for the Anglican Links with Kentucky and Byumba which has been wound up, were given.

The day ended at 1600 hours - on time - with the Dean giving the Confirmation of the Acts of Synod and the Blessing.

A good and interesting day, most of the time!

NEWS FROM THE PROVINCE

Last month we reported that Primus is to retire with effect from the 31st July this year. We now learn that the Bishop of Brechin is also to retire on this date. The following extract is from the statement written by The Most Rev David Chillingworth, Bishop of St Andrews, Dunkeld & Dunblane and Primus of the Scottish Episcopal Church, and has been copied from the Inspires Magazine. (MP's bold highlighting.)

"As my own retirement takes effect, **a new Primus** will be elected by the members of the College of Bishops from among their own number at **the end of June**.

Meanwhile the Episcopal Election for the **Diocese of Aberdeen and Orkney** is proceeding. The Preparatory Committee will shortly re-advertise for nominations and the exacting timetable set out under Canon 4 leads us to expect the election of **a new bishop by midsummer.**

Bishop Gregor is recovering well from his recent illness and hopes to be able to return to work during the next few months.

Episcopal Elections in the **Diocese of St Andrews** and **the Diocese of Brechin** will begin in late summer and should be complete in early 2018.


This will of course be a demanding period but those with longer memories will know that it is not exceptional. The dioceses which for a period are without a bishop will be cared for in each case by their Dean working with an interim Bishop provided by the College of Bishops. The new Primus will preside over the Episcopal Elections but Canon 4 does make provision for another member of the College to preside if that becomes necessary.

Above all it is a time for prayer for our church. The discernment of new leadership is a spiritual trust and we should pray for all who are involved. It is also an opportunity, through the discernment of new leadership, to explore the calling of our dioceses and of the Scottish Episcopal Church."

SAINT OF THE MONTH

Saint Ebba: 2nd April

This is the second saint of this name associated with the Benedictine Priory at Coldingham. Little is known about this particular Ebba, except that she was abbess at the Priory.

Her main claim to fame is written in a ninth century chronicle. She saw a horde of Viking invaders land nearby and she feared the worst from them, expecting all of the nuns would be raped. She assembled all the nuns, then took a razor and cut off her nose and her top lip; all the others followed her example. This made their appearance so disgusting to the invaders that the women escaped being ravished. However, the Vikings soon returned and set fire to the convent, with the nuns inside, killing the entire community. This happened on 2nd April 870.

There is a suggestion that this event is the origin of the expression "cutting off the nose to spite the face".

AN EASTER RECIPE

Simnel cake is eaten during the Easter period in the UK and Ireland, in particular. It was originally made for the middle Sunday of Lent, when the 40-day fast would be relaxed. This Sunday is known as Laetare Sunday, with alternative names of Refreshment Sunday, Rose Sunday, Sunday of the Five Loaves and Mothering Sunday. The meaning of the word "simnel" is unclear; there is a 1226 reference to "bread made into a simnel", which is understood to mean the finest white bread, from the Latin *simila*, meaning "fine flour".

By convention the cake is decorated with marzipan balls (11 in number) to represent the Apostles (minus Judas Iscariot), though some versions use 12 balls by including Jesus himself. This tradition developed late in the Victorian era.

They have been known since at least Medieval times; at one point they became a Mothering Sunday tradition, when young girls in service would make one to take home to their mothers on their day off.

Ingredients:

For the almond paste: 175g plain flour

250g caster sugar Pinch of salt

250g ground almonds ½ tsp ground mixed spice

2 free-range eggs, beaten 350g mixed raisins, currants and sultanas

1 tsp almond essence 55g chopped mixed peel

For the cake: ½ lemon, grated zest only

175g butter or margarine 1-2 tbsp apricot jam

175g soft brown sugar 1 free-range egg, beaten for glazing

3 free-range eggs, beaten

Method:

<u>For the almond paste</u>: place the sugar and ground almonds in a bowl. Add enough beaten egg and mix to a fairly soft consistency. Add the almond essence and knead for one minute until the paste is smooth and pliable. Roll out a third of the almond paste to make a circle 18cm (7in) in diameter and reserve the remainder for the cake topping.

Preheat oven to 140C/275F/Gas 1. Grease and line a 18cm (7in) cake tin.

<u>For the cake</u>: cream the butter and sugar together until pale and fluffy. Gradually beat in the eggs until well incorporated and then sift in the flour, salt and mixed spice a little at a time. Finally add the mixed dried fruit, peel and grated lemon zest and stir into the mixture.

Put half the mixture into a greased, lined 18cm (7in) cake tin. Smooth the top and cover with the circle of almond paste. Add the rest of the cake mixture and smooth the top, leaving a slight dip in the centre to allow for the cake to rise. Bake in the preheated oven for 1¾ hours.

Test by inserting a skewer in the middle of the cake; if it comes out clean, the cake is ready, remove the cake from the oven and set it aside to cool on a wire rack.

Brush the top of the cooled cake with the apricot jam. Divide the remainder of the almond paste in half; roll out a circle to cover the top of the cake with one half and form 11 small balls with the other half.

Place the circle of paste on the jam glaze and set the balls round the edge. Brush the cake topping with a little beaten egg.

Preheat the grill to high. Place the cake onto a baking tray and grill for 1-2 minutes, or until the top of the marzipan begins to brown.



Then on the Sunday it was off to Penrith to celebrate with relatives and friends who live south of the border

Julie Dennison made her a cake to share with the Bible Study Group on Monday morning. Nicholas and I were treated to a slice on Monday afternoon. When we were taking her home she said what a lovely time she had and that she couldn't believe she was 90. **The Twelve Apostles** in Nithsdale near Dumfries is the largest stone circle on the Scottish mainland and is located between the villages of <u>Holywood</u> and Newbridge, near Dumfries. It is the seventh largest stone circle in Britain and is similar in design to the

stone circles of Cumbria, and is considered to be an outlier of this group. The tallest upright is roughly 2 metres tall, but the largest recumbent stone measures about 3.2 metres.

The site is split by a hedge and contains eleven stones (the twelfth one having gone missing sometime in the 19th century; local custom has it that **Judas Iscariot** was responsible for its loss). Its south-westerly arrangement aligns it with the midwinter sunset.



THE RUTHWELL CROSS



The Ruthwell Cross was designed as a preaching cross: using the carvings as a picture book for the 'humble'. Two of its faces are carved with scenes from the New Testament. On the broad faces of the cross are carved scenes that illustrate Christ's divinity, the Holy Trinity and the four Evangelists who wrote the gospels - Mathew, Mark, Luke and John.

The cross was smashed by Presbyterianiconoclasts in 1642, and the pieces left in the churchyard until they were restored and re-erected in the manse garden in 1823 by Henry Duncan. In 1887 it was moved into its current location inside Ruthwell church, when the apse which holds it was specially built.
